The long spelling of the definite article ($\pi \epsilon$ -, $\pi \epsilon$ -, $\kappa \epsilon$ -) is used where expected in Sahidic,⁵⁷ with but three exceptions: 125:9 $\pi \overline{\pi \kappa \lambda}$, 220:7 $\overline{\kappa} 2BHOY\epsilon$, 130:2 $\Theta I[H.$

Further orthographic fluctuation is evidenced by variations in the relling of individual words and grammatical forms: $\Delta M \Delta Z T \in (IX)/$ EMAZTE (2X), ΔPI - (IX)/EPI- (IX), $E N \in Q$ (IOX)/ $\Delta N H Q \in (3X)$, EPAT- (I3X)/EPET- (I42:19 EPET-THOYTN), KE- (IX)/GE- (if my analysis of 144:20 is correct), $\overline{M}MO$ - (passim)/ $\overline{M}M\Delta$ + (I38:12-I3), EEEYE (IX)/MEOYE (IX), $COY\overline{N}$ - (2X)/COYWN- (3X), THOYTN (TX)/THNOY (3X), OYWW (IX)/OYWWE (2X), $WQ \in (6X)/\Delta Q \in (IX)$, H (IX)/E2H (IX), MAPIQAM (4X)/MAPIQAMMH (7X) Rel Pres ETOY- (4X)/ETEY- (IX), Fut 2 pl. In addition, there are a number of words and forms which occur in more or less unexpected spellings, without variants: MHE (12X), NAE (IX), absolute possessive pron pl. NW= (2X), $\overline{N}NA2P\overline{N}$ - (IX), CAEIE (X), CEXT- (IX), 2IE (2X), 20 λ EG (IX), XWBE (2X), MONOXOC (IX), III Fut neg 3 pl. $\overline{N}NO\gamma$ - (IX), Cond 2 sing. f EPWAN- (IX).⁵⁹ We call creduction is not orthographically expressed in $\overline{N}TWT\overline{N}$ - (2X), TYWW- (IX), and WMK- (IX).

The Relative Perfect forms are spelled with initial $\overline{\mathbf{N}}$ (as also the II Perfect forms), never with $\mathbf{e}\mathbf{N}$. But $\mathbf{e}\mathbf{rarer}\overline{\mathbf{N}}$ is the only attested melling of the 2 pl. form (145:20), and the paradigm also contains the forms $\pi\mathbf{e}\mathbf{N}\mathbf{Ta2}$ - (146:18*), $\mathbf{e}\mathbf{Ta2}$ - (132:16), and $\mathbf{e}\mathbf{p}$ - (133:10).⁶⁰

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the Pauline epistles, the affinity with deutero-Pauline language, and the possible use of Gos. Thom. suggest a date for the composition of Dial. Sav. in the early decades of the second century c.E. The work certainly belongs to an earlier period than the Epistula apostolorum (which presupposes the Pauline corpus and whose author possibly knew several gospels of the New Testament canon) and Justin Martyr (who used the gospels of Matthew and Luke). But the dialogue source used by the author of Dial. Sav. should be dated in the last decades of the first century c.E., and certainly not later than the gospel of John. 35
